What is an amphibian? You'll learn about frogs, salamanders and newts. You will be wised-up on the use of those common terms 'frog' and 'toad'. What do frogs do when it is cold or during dry times? Note: Increasing concerns regarding the vulnerability on many amphibian species has led to a careful review and update of the requirements listed at the above GC website. The following SPD requirements reflect our commitment to preserve God's creation.

The alarming decrease in amphibian numbers has led to many countries creating strict laws regarding the handling of amphibians, especial frogs and toads. Requirements relating to handling frogs / toads are no longer required by the SPD.

- 1. What are the characteristics of amphibians?
- 2. Name the two main orders of Amphibia and tell how to distinguish between them.
- 3. Explain the use of the common names 'toad' and 'frog'.
- 4. How do amphibians protect themselves?
- 5. Describe the typical life history of amphibians.
- 6. Explain the economic value of amphibians.
- 7. Where do some frogs go when it is dry or cold?
- 8. How do frogs sing? What makes the noise so loud?
- 9 Frogs feature prominently in the Bible. Give three examples.
- In many places, the number of amphibians (especially frogs) is decreasing alarmingly. Give reasons why this is so, especially where you live and explain what you can do about it
- 11. Make brief notes on at least four (4) amphibians. You must include at least one example each of a frog/toad, salamander and newt. Include a description, where found, food, breeding habits and an interesting fact.
- 12. Do one of the following. Remember; do not handle frogs and toads.
 - a. Visit a place where amphibians live in their natural state and write a brief report on your visit describing the amphibians found, their number and the sounds they make. A night time visit may allow you to identify them by sound.
 - b. Make a list of amphibians found in your area. Include their common names, where they live and interesting facts in your report.
 - c. Visit a place where amphibians are exhibited; for example museum, zoo, nature reserve etc and write a report on your visit.
