You'll learn what makes birds different to other creatures and understand more about the creativity and love of our God. You will reflect on how birds impact on the lives of people, especially the people of your country or where you live.

There's plenty to practical things to do; identifying birds - some by sight and some by sound. There's a choice of setting up a feeding station, observing an occupied bird's nest or making a study of a bird habitat. Come to think of it, if you're keen, you can do all three!

- 1. Give two five characteristics which set birds apart from all other creatures.
- 2. Name three flightless birds, tell what their diet consists of and name the country or continent in which each one lives.
- 3. Give the day of the week when birds were created. Find in the Bible the names of five birds and be able to name them from memory.
- 4. Write or *Give* orally three ways in which God's love and purpose is shown in the creation of birds.
- 5. Describe how you and your family can attract wild birds into your home environment in a long-term sustainable way.
- 6. Name five ways by which birds impact on the lives of people. Some of these must relate to people of your country or where you live.
- 7. Make a list of *at least* thirty *twenty* (20) species of wild birds, including birds from at least five different orders, that you personally have observed and positively identified by sight. out of doors.
- 8. Make a list of five (5) species of wild birds that you personally have positively identified by sound. out of doors.
- 9. Do *at least* one of the following:
 - a. Set up a feeding station and report on the bird visitors observed for a period of *at least* seven days.
 - b. Find an 'occupied' bird's nest, identify the species of the bird that built it, describe the nest in detail, observe the nest for five days, and report what happened at the nest on each of the days.
 - c. In the Western Hemisphere: Maintain a hummingbird feeder for 2 months.
 - (1) What does man made nectar consist of?
 - (2) Why shouldn't you use food coloring or honey?
 - (3) When should the feeder fluid be changed?
 - (4) How should the feeder be cared for?
 - c. In other areas of the world: Select at least three different habitats in your area and make comparative bird lists of them indicating the differences in birds expected and found. Make at least three visits to a wild-bird habitat. Make a brief report on the number of birds observed, the number of <u>different</u> birds observed and any interesting things you saw.
